On August 21st, Mercy University Hospital was delighted to welcome Minister for Finance, Michael McGrath, TD, to officially open the Roche Building which is home to two wards - St. Camillus and St. Anthony's and a hybrid Theatre Suite. The Minister was joined by the Lord Mayor of Cork, Cllr Kieran McCarthy and many honoured guests including the family of Sr. Laurentia Roche (RIP).

In October 2020, the hospital submitted a proposal to the HSE to combine the existing approved theatre refurbishment and 30 bed modular unit projects into one discrete development to be completed under the Covid-19 Emergency legislation as part of the MUH response to the Covid-19 Emergency. In December 2020, the hospital received capital approval from the National Director of Estates, to proceed with the project and Clancy Construction were appointed as the main contractor for the project and commenced on site on 6th April 2021.

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Clancy Construction have a proven track record in delivering complex healthcare projects and the collaborative approach from all stakeholders was key to the successful delivery of the project. This project has seen the largest capital investment received by the hospital for some time with a project cost including construction, design team fees, equipping, contingency, inflation ex gratia payment and other costs of €22.38m.



The Roche building has given the hospital 30 additional and much needed inpatient beds and 2 new operating theatres, all built to the highest standards and will enable the hospital to continue to deliver quality healthcare to its patients. The new build will enable the hospital to offer robotic surgery, the benefits of which are well known and understood. This investment is strongly linked to sustainability and the hospital's long tradition of excellence in compassionate care, education, and research.

Mr Des Riordan, associate director with Clancy Construction, was previously quoted in the Irish Examiner

as saying it had been "a massive feat of engineering, logistics, collaboration and meticulous planning from the entire team" to deliver within an 18-month timeframe (work started in April 2021) while working in a confined space, in a live hospital environment. At the peak of the works, the average number of workers on site was 108.

## The 'Roche' Building

The development is named after the former Matron of Mercy University Hospital, Sr Laurentia Roche, RIP who passed away in St Maries of the Isle Convent on 31st January 2023. Sr Laurentia was the last Matron of the Mercy Hospital, handing over this role to lay Directors of Nursing in June of 2003. CEO, Anne Coyle paid tribute to Sr. Laurentia, "I did not have the opportunity to meet Sr Laurentia in person, however listening to the multitude of stories about her, I know that countless patients and their families benefited from her leadership, nursing experience, compassion, wisdom and kindness. It is truly fitting that the hospital is able to honour her legacy and ensure she will not be forgotten".

# Florence Nightingale Senior Leadership Scholarship

Mercy University Hospital is delighted to acknowledge and congratulate MUH Director of Nursing Margaret McKiernan, who was the recipient of a nationally awarded scholarship to participate in a Florence Nightingale Foundation (FNF) Senior Leadership Programme. She completed this programme in September 2023 and attended the graduation ceremony in the FNF London Academy.

The FNF programmes are created to enable scholars to explore and discover their own leadership style and develop the essential skills to be a courageous leader.

The course is delivered part-time over 18 months, an experienced nursing mentor is allocated to each scholar. The core programme for all leadership scholarships includes:

- · Individual scholar assessment.
- Compassionate leadership development programme delivered by the King's Fund (2 days residential).
- Personal Presence and Impact delivered by the Royal Academy of Dramatic Arts (3 days).
- Delivery of a Quality Improvement project to promote clinical excellence.
- Bespoke development opportunities chosen by the Scholar
- Invite to the Florence Nightingale Commemorative Service at Westminster Abbey, London in 2025.

Margaret shared with Mercy Times, what this programme meant to her and what it means for the patients and staff of Mercy University Hospital, "Healthcare delivery is complex and the FNF scholarship afforded me the opportunity to understand my influence as a senior leader in my organisation and how to exercise my authority and maximise my impact for the greater benefit of the department of nursing and the wider hospital and hold the space of nursing clearly in the organization I work in.

I am now a proud member of a global alumni nursing network in which we learn from each other and continue to have



the opportunities for connection with healthcare systems, nationally and internationally. I have learnt from and have been humbled by the experience and nursing knowledge of my fellow scholarship recipients and this learning is now reflected in my daily work. My role as Director of Nursing is to hold the space of nursing and ensure the unique contribution nursing makes to every patient encounter as an integral part of the wider multidisciplinary team, is clearly articulated and understood.

The Leadership Retreat in Eden Cornwall was one of the highlights of my scholarship. We were afforded an opportunity to engage and explore our leadership roles and our personal sense of authenticity in these roles and how we bring this authenticity and meaning to our work and indeed our lives.

The scholarship was also a unique opportunity to carry out a quality improvement project which will contribute to improving clinical care and impacting positively on outcomes for clinical staff and patients' families through more effective communication (using the ISBAR plus tool). The overall aim of the project was to provide and evaluate an evidence-based education programme to improve challenging communication by clinicians with families of patients over the phone."



# **Mercy First!**

Ground-breaking Kidney Stone Surgery Performed for the First Time at Children's Hospital Ireland by Mercy University Hospital Consultant



In an unprecedented medical collaboration, Mr Derek Hennessey, a Consultant Urologist at Mercy University Hospital, recently visited Children's Hospital Ireland, Crumlin, to perform the nation's first paediatric percutaneous nephrolithotomy (PCNL), marking a momentous milestone in Irish medical history.

Often reserved for adults, this complex procedure removes large or complex kidney stones minimally invasively. Mr Hennessey, renowned for his expertise in kidney stone surgery and research was requested to perform this procedure due to his considerable experience and reputation with the surgery. His decision to lead this ground-breaking operation highlighted the ever-collaborative spirit among Ireland's healthcare institutions and has paved the way for expanded treatment options within paediatric urology in the country.

The operation involved making a small incision in the patient's back to provide direct access to the kidney, followed by the meticulous removal of the kidney stone. Patients undergoing PCNL typically experience a shorter hospital stay and a quicker return to daily activities when compared to other methods of large kidney stone removal, underlining the significance of this option within paediatric care. While the patient is currently in recovery, the operation has been hailed a resounding success, ushering in a new era where advanced urological procedures, once only accessible to adults, are now within reach for the paediatric population in Ireland. Mr Hennessey has been invited back to Children's Hospital Ireland, Crumlin, to perform the surgery again soon.

# Patient First – World Patient Safety Day



Mercy University Hospital recently promoted World Patient Safety Day highlighting the 2024 theme 'Engaging the patient for patient Safety'.

This event was organised by Derina Byrne, Medication Safety Pharmacist, Tracey Dinneen, Patient Liaison Officer, and the Quality & Risk Management Department and recognised the crucial role patients, families and care givers play in the safety of healthcare. - Medical words and terms can be difficult. If you don't understand them, feel free to ask me to explain.

Patient Safety is a priority at MUH. We all have an important role to play in providing a quality service where the patient fully understands their healthcare needs."

# Mercy University Hospital - Research Strategy 2023 - 2027

On Thursday September 28th, 2023, the Mercy University Hospital – Research Strategy 2023 – 2027 was officially launched with a reception in the hospital. Clinical Director, Dr Kieran O'Connor and Research Manager, Dr Evelyn Flanagan presented an outline of the strategy to a gathering of staff, management, academic partners, and guests.

The vision of the strategy is to improve patient health through world class research. There are four main aims in the strategy:

- Develop a culture that embraces the pursuit of research to improve clinical practice and deliver exceptional care.
- 2. Empower patients as partners in high quality research.
- 3. Increase collaborative partnerships.
- 4. Develop research structures and supports.

This research strategy builds on the proud tradition of research excellence and in pioneering advances in clinical practice at the Mercy University Hospital. The Mercy University Hospital is a teaching & research hospital affiliated with University College Cork and the Health Research Board Clinical Research Facility has its

administrative centre and adult research unit located on the Mercy University Hospital site. This research strategy also highlights the on-going collaboration with two of our leading partners in UCC, APC Microbiome Ireland and the Tyndall National Institute, who were represented at the launch.

# Happy 30th Birthday - MUH Cardiology Department

Mercy University Hospital recently hosted a special celebration to honour 30 years of the Cardiology Department. Mercy Times caught up with Cardiac Physiologist, Claire O'Herlihy to acknowledge this incredible milestone.

"It is hard to imagine it is 30 years since the MUH opened the doors of a non-invasive cardiology investigative lab in the prefabrication building adjacent to X Ray. Prof Michael Murphy was the lead cardiologist and had a specialist interest in cardiac pharmacology. The source of funding for the Department came from this strand of medicine and so our name over the door for the first 20 years of our existence was "Dept of Clinical Pharmacology". Our first NCHD rotation included the familiar names of Dr Conor O Shea and Dr Carl Vaughan.



Access to the Department provided the biggest challenge as it included a ramp and a 90-degree corner which restricted any use of trolleys. Thank goodness our only "emergency" during the 10 odd years there was a fire drill. This event was triggered by the celebration of a 40th birthday and the resulting smoke from candles triggered an alarm which resulted in Donie Goulding and company running down the corridor with fire extinguishers in hand.

The Department has expanded over the years and this growth was acknowledged when we transferred to the fourth floor (penthouse) of Lee View Block in the early 2000's. When the time came for Prof Michael Murphy to take up the reins as President of UCC, Prof Carl Vaughan stepped in as cardiologist and head of Department. In 2004. He was joined by Prof David Kerins in 2006.

Together they provide expertise in invasive assessment by angiogram and the ever-expanding cardiac CT, MRI, and genetic mapping.

The initial staffing for the Department was provided by the Dept of Nursing as was the practice nationally. This has evolved and now the staff are a combination of Nursing and Cardiac Physiologists.

The Department provides both inpatient and outpatient cardiac services. Electrocardiogram (ECG), 24-hour blood pressure monitoring, 24–72-hour Holter monitoring, Exercise stress testing (EST), Cardioversion, Trans thoracic Echocardiograph (TTE), and transoesophageal Echo (TOE) are provided.

Demands on the Department increase each year as the hospital expands. Reflecting this, we are developing a new Clinic Room. This year will also see the Department linked into the MUH IT system which will provide unlimited data storage, data access remotely and ultimately, the opportunity to request the various investigations online."

# Introducing – the National Cancer Information System (NCIS)

Mercy University Hospital (MUH) is delighted to incorporate an information system to its cancer care services to enhance the care pathway of for the people it serves.



On August 14th, 2023, the Mercy University Hospital went live with the National Cancer Information System (NCIS). NCIS is a single national computerised system for the delivery of Systemic Anti-Cancer Therapy (SACT) in Medical Oncology and Haemato-Oncology care services.

NCIS will allow for the e-prescribing, recording of compounding and dispensing of medicines in the pharmacy aseptic unit and for the e-administration of SACT and supportive medicines. It also includes functionality for hosting and recording Multi-Disciplinary Meetings (MDM) and generating reports.

#### **National Rollout**

The National rollout of the NCIS project is being led by the National Cancer Control Programme (NCCP) in conjunction with the HSE office of eHealth and Disruptive Technologies who are responsible for the delivery of technology to support and improve healthcare in Ireland. It is a key priority project for the NCCP to facilitate hospitals in implementing quality, efficient SACT in line with the National Cancer Strategy 2012-2026.

NCIS is to be introduced to all 26 Public Hospitals (both voluntary and statutory) providing SACT to oncology and haemato-oncology patients. The Mercy was the 12th hospital to go live nationally following on from its South/Southwest colleagues in University Hospital Kerry who went live in April 2022 and the South Infirmary Victoria University Hospital who went live in February 2023.

#### **Benefits**

The benefits of implementing this system are numerous. It will allow for greater visibility of patient's haematology oncology information by presenting all relevant healthcare providers with a timely complete longitudinal overview of a patient through a single point of access.

Other key benefits include:

- recording of all medical oncology and haematology data in a consistent manner
- enhanced security of patient's personal information
- enhanced medicines governance
- access to patient SACT records to facilitate the continuation of the care or the transition of care in a seamless manner off site should the need arise.

#### **The Team**

The road to "Go Live" was navigated by a local NCIS implementation team led by Geraldine O'Rourke NCIS Project manager, a dual qualified engineer and pharmacist with experience in software development & project management as well as clinical experience in both primary and secondary care settings. In partnership with NCIS colleagues, Maeve Dennehy Chief II Pharmacist Dispensary & Clinical Services & outgoing NCIS Pharmacist lead, Elaine Crowley Senior Pharmacist & NCIS pharmacist lead and Sinead Holland Paediatric Nurse with a special interest in Oncology and NCIS Nurse lead. The team faced challenges during the implementation but with the

inspirational support and guidance of a broad and highly experienced Steering Group Committee led by the Project SRO Director of Nursing Margaret McKiernan and the clinical Lead Professor Derek Power the true essence of the Mercy Value of Team Spirit endured.

The Steering Group Committee comprised of representatives from nursing (CNM3 Valerie O'Mahony), pharmacy (Pharmacy Manager Ciaran Halleran), information technology communication Manager Peter O'Callaghan), healthcare records ( Healthcare Records Manager Edel Coakley and MDT co-ordinators Jennifer Bracken and Ann Williams), paediatric nursing (Aife O' Connell, Clare Curtin, Noreen Crowley) as well as administration (Deirdre O'Connor).

#### **The Way Forward**

The Mercy University Hospital, under the stewardship of CEO Anne Coyle, is committed to advancing its digital innovation strategies by engaging with modalities that aim to improve services, optimise processes, improve efficiencies, progress internal collaboration, and reduce costs whilst complying with data security and information governance. The NCIS project may be in its infancy. but it's aim is to assist in solidifying MUH's position at the forefront of providing patient centred, evidence-based care by utilising the most up to date technologies available, and in the spirit of the Sisters of Mercy support the health and wellbeing of the those we serve.

## **Sonny Curran Memorial Skydive in aid of Mercy Kids & Teens Appeal**





Our colleague, Porter Colin Curran has recently completed a charity skydive in memory of his little boy, Sonny, who sadly passed away on October 18th, 2020, at just 25 days old.

When he was born, Sonny was diagnosed with Congenital Diaphragmatic Hernia (CDH), meaning he had a hole in his diaphragm. Sadly, Sonny passed away in the care of the staff of Crumlin Children's Hospital a few weeks later.

Three years on and Colin is planning his skydive in aid of the Mercy University Hospital Foundation's Kids & Teens Appeal. The skydive was due to take place September 25th, on what would be Sonny's 3rd birthday, remembering the little boy who touched the lives of his family and the close-knit community in Cork's northside during his short life. Unfortunately, due to adverse weather conditions the skydive was rescheduled to 25th of November.

Colin was joined by a group of colleagues including Hospital Porters, Philip Aldridge, Evan Cashman, James Taylor, Micheal Murray and Jimmy McCarthy; as well as Healthcare Assistant, Jason O'Sullivan, who supported the cause and completed the charity skydive at Irish Parachute Club, Co. Offlay. To be joined by so many of his colleagues was a great morale boost to the teams concerned and demonstrated an innate understanding of our core values – especially team spirit!

In the three years since Sonny's passing Colin together with his family and friends have raised over €50,000 in memory of his beloved Son, for various organizations that provided care and support for Colin and his family during an extremely difficult time. This year he has raised over €15,000 for the Mercy Foundation and is on track to hit €20,000. A fantastic result for a very worthy cause. Thank you, Colin.

# Meet the Team – Medical Social Work Department



## **Mercy Spirit**

The Medical Social Work (MSW) Department has been operational at Mercy University Hospital from 1989 and embodies the Mercy ethos in its truest sense. The values underpinning social work practice are aligned with those of the Mercy University Hospital; the department is focussed particularly on addressing the psychosocial needs of patients and their families in an active spirit of promoting compassionate social justice.

Social Work is a profession based on principles of human rights and social justice that work to empower individuals, groups, and communities to develop their full potential and well-being. A practice priority is very much focussed on meeting the needs of vulnerable and marginalised individuals and groups. Owing to the inner-city location of Mercy University Hospital, this priority particularly informs all social work interventions in the hospital setting.

### **Growth and Expansion**

Since the establishment of a social work service at MUH in 1989, the team has experienced significant expansion and development, both in terms of resources and specialist areas. Originally a stand-alone post, the MSW service is now resourced by a team of twelve. The MSW team structure includes, at present, a Principal Social Worker, Social Work Team Leader, Senior Medical Social Workers (x3) and Staff Grade Medical Social Workers/PQSWs (x5). All Medical Social Workers are qualified to postgraduate level and are registered by the Statutory Regulator CORU – the Health and Social Care Professionals Council. MUH Medical Social Workers subscribe to the CORU Code of Professional Conduct and Ethics for Social Workers (2011).

#### **Our Service**

In practical terms, the MSW Department deals with psychosocial issues associated with Homelessness, Domestic, Sexual and Gender Based Violence (DSGBV), Alcohol and Substance Misuse, Child Protection and Welfare, and Adult Safeguarding (Older and/or Vulnerable Adults) issues. Referrals relating to these issues are received form the Emergency Department, Mercy Urgent Care Centre, St Francis Unit, and all hospital

wards. In addition, there are Medical Social Workers designated to the specialist areas including Gerontology, Paediatric Haematology/Oncology, Adult Oncology, and Palliative Care.

Year on year, the Medical Social Work Department experiences an increase in the number of referrals received from all service areas across the MUH Campus. 2022 saw a 24% increase on the number of referrals received and this trend is, approaching year's end, already increasing significantly. This upward trend is indicative of the growing complexities with which people are tasked to navigate in their lives, and reflects changing social demographics, increased social isolation, and the broad diminution of social networks and related supports available to individuals generally. A Senior Medical Social Worker, Inclusion Health, has recently been appointed and will deliver this specialist service from January 2024.

## **Compliance and Regulation**

Social work practice is informed and scaffolded by statutory regulations and legislation. Medical Social Workers are the key stakeholders in the management of child protection and welfare concerns. As mandated persons (*with* our HSCP, medical and nursing colleagues), our practice is informed by the Children First Act 2015, Children First Guidance for the Protection and Welfare of Children 2017 and HSE Child Protection and Welfare Policy 2019. Medical Social Work, with our Quality and Risk Management colleagues, continue to promote the implementation of Children First in the hospital setting.

Recent legislation relating to Assisted Decision Making (Assisted Decision-Making Capacity Act 2015) represents a significant service demand in the acute setting. A Senior Medical Social Worker was appointed this year and designated to ADM related issues. An Implementation Group has also been established to oversee staff responsibilities relating to ADM referrals. This implementation process is supported by a full-time Project Manager.

From a multi-disciplinary and interagency perspective, the Medical Social Work Department is, at present, represented on the following committees and steering groups:

Department continues to empower our patients and to support them in finding their voice.





# "OPAT: Your Path Home" (an online patient resource)

Outpatient parenteral antibiotic treatment (OPAT) allows patients who are medically stable to safely receive their intravenous (IV) medication at home, if they have been assessed as suitable. When the COVID-19 pandemic hit, it became harder for OPAT patients and their families to have in-person discussions with the hospital OPAT team due to face masks and visitor restrictions. There was no national online resource for OPAT patients available to learn about the program. Responding to this need, Fiona Guidera and Liz Forde devised a plan! Fiona recently shared this wonderful success story with Mercy Times.

#### **SPARK Innovation**

"Liz Forde and I were OPAT Clinical Nurse Specialists at the Mercy and we applied for funding to create an online resource. In April 2021, we were successful and received €2,000 funding from the HSE SPARK Innovation COVID Call. With support from Margaret McKiernan, Director of Nursing and Kay O'Mahony, Assistant Director of Nursing, we partnered with the Creative Digital Media course at Cork College of Further Education, Douglas Street (formerly known as St. Johns College). We were facilitated by Paula McCarthy Principal, Deirdre McCann, Creative Digital Media Course Co-ordinator, and colleague Brid Corcoran. Arthur Jackson, Infectious Disease Consultant & Clinical Lead for the OPAT Service CUH and MUH worked with us to develop the resources.

The class of 2021/22 Creative Digital Media took on this extracurricular project during the year and after their end of year exams. Together we produced an online patient resource. Four videos provide information about OPAT for patients, families, and carers:

- OPAT-Your Path Home A short animation
- OPAT Before You Go Home Video
- OPAT -When You Go Home Video
- OPAT Role of Infectious Disease Consultant Video

#### **Success**

In December 2022, this collaborative initiative between MUH/ HSE and Cork College of Further Education won the Further Education Category of the Cork Lifelong Learning Awards for "Innovative Inter-Agency Lifelong Learning Endeavours" that contributes to community and society. In June 2023, a poster (assisted by Breeda Herlihy, MUH, Librarian) about the project was awarded the category prize for "Improvements in Effective Care & Support", at the MUH Clinical Audit and Quality Improvement Day.

The students benefitted greatly from working with us on the project, not only enhancing their knowledge and skills but giving them a taste of the demands and delights of working on a professional project. Best of all has been the feedback we've received from both patients and families on how the videos help them better understand the possibilities of OPAT. My former colleague Liz Forde is now the Advanced Nurse Practitioner for the Cork OPAT service which is facilitating an increased number of patients to leave hospital sooner than they previously might have."

To keep us cosy for dark winter evenings, MUH Senior Chef, **Gary Costello** has not one, but two wonderful recipes to share!

# **Curried Pumpkin and Coconut Soup**



## **INGREDIENTS**

- 1 kilo of pumpkin roasted.
- 2 large, sweet potatoes peeled and diced.
- 100gr carrots peeled and diced.
- 1 large onion diced.
- 50gr chopped celery.
- 4 tsps. garam masala
- 1 tsp of cumin

- 1 tsp of coriander
- 1 chilli chopped.
- 1 tsb turmeric
- 1 can of coconut milk 400ml
- 1 litres of vegetable stock
- 50 gr butter
- 50 gr flour

## **METHOD**

- 1. Roast pumpkin and remove flesh from skin.
- 2. In a pot sweat of onions carrots celery and sweet potato and chilli in the butter
- 3. Then add your spices and continue to cook.
- 4. Then remove from the heat and add flour slowly.
- 5. Return to heat and add your hot stock slowly to the mixture.
- 6. Then add your roasted pumpkin and coconut milk.
- 7. Continue to cook for 30 minutes.
- 8. Blend and season with salt and white pepper Serve with warm brown bread

# **Slow Cooked Beef Red Onion Hot Pot**



## **INGREDIENTS**

- 1 kilo of steak pieces.
- 100gr carrots roughly chopped.
- 200 grams of red onions roughly chopped.
- 100 grams celery
- 15 grams thyme
- 2 cloves garlic crushed
- 1 bay leaf.
- 50 grams butter
- 70 grams flour

- 150grms red onion relish
- 2 bay leaf's
- 25 grams of tomato paste
- 1 glass of red wine. 1 for the pot -1 for you.
- 1 litre of warm beef stock
- 1 kilo of potatoes peeled par boiled and finely sliced.

## **METHOD**

- 1. Toss the beef in 20 grams of the flour to coat well -remove excess flour
- 2. Add butter to a heavy sauce pan and brown your beef.
- 3. Remove beef and place into casserole dish.
- 4. Fry onions and carrots and celery in the same pan that the beef was in.
- 5. Add garlic and thyme and stir well
- 6. Add tomato paste.
- 7. Remove from heat and add remaining flour
- 8. Transfer back to the stove and cook it out and slowly add your beef stock and red wine
- 9. Then add your onion relish and bay leaf's and bring to simmer. Season well
- 10. Transfer this mixture onto your beef and cover with parchment and tin foil.
- 11. Cook for 3hours at 160 degrees.
- 12. When this is done take it from the oven and top with the sliced potatoes
- 13. Butter the tops of the potatoes with a little garlic butter and fresh thyme and salt
- 14. Place back into the oven until potatoes are crisp Serve with creamed potato and green beans



# **Challenging Ageism - Positive Ageing Week**

Positive Ageing Week (PAW) was celebrated at Mercy University Hospital throughout the first week of October. PAW is an Age Action initiative to promote the agency of older people and to celebrate the contributions they make to our families, workplaces, communities, and society. Specialist Registrar in Geriatric Medicine, Aoife O'Connor shared, with Mercy Times, as to why PAW is so important.

"The week was dedicated to Challenging Ageism which refers to how we think, feel and act towards others and ourselves based on age. Ageism may be conscious or unconscious. Age is one of the first things we notice about someone, and ageism arises when age is used to categorise people in ways that harms or disadvantages them.

As part of a PAW we aimed to promote age equality. This involves making an active effort to overcome discrimination based on age. This can be done by promoting educational activities to enhance understanding and empathy about ageing, and by addressing policies and laws that tackle inequality. Intergenerational contact also has many benefits, including improved health and psychosocial wellbeing, with an enhanced sense of social connectedness. and reduced loneliness.



#### **Volunteering**

As part of PAW, the Irish Guide Dogs for the Blind paid a visit to MUH. A waggy worker, along with human volunteers, donated a few hours of his time to educate the patients, staff and visitors about the charity. The national charity is dedicated to enabling people with vision impairment and families of children with autism to improve mobility and independence. They have almost 400 guide and assistance dogs' clients in Ireland and provide the service free of charge. The charity was initially founded in a small farmhouse in Co Cork in 1976. It is estimated that almost 250,000 people are visually impaired or blind. This charity is a vital resource to enable these people to maintain their freedom, and all donations to their charity or time volunteered to the service are greatly appreciated. This may be done by assisting with puppy raising, temporary boarding, rehoming or fundraising.

#### Men's Sheds

On Wednesday, the City of Corks Men's Shed, raised the roof of MUH. This group is part of the City of Cork Male Voice Choir, which is coming into its 55th anniversary. The Men's Shed is community-based project, initially formed in Ireland in 2009, in Tipperary. There are now over 450 throughout Ireland. It offers a movement where men come together after retirement to learn, share skills, get involved in community work and make long lasting friendships. Each shed is autonomous, with activities differing from one group to the next.

This City of Corks Men's Shed, have been volunteering their time, by singing and performing throughout the county visiting nursing homes, masses, providing concerts for charities and fundraisers. If you have a skill you would like to share or learn a skill, or get involved with the local community, more information is available on *menssheds.ie* 

As part of PAW week, we look to continue to reframe how we think, feel and act towards ageing and older people. Going forward, I would encourage everyone to be aware of promoting a positive attitude towards ageing. It is important to keep fit and healthy, feel good about yourself, and engage fully in life as you age, and encourage others to do so too!"

# **Collaboration with Triskel Arts Centre**

**Neasa Fitzpatrick**, SpR in Geriatric Medicine told Mercy Times of a very exciting collaboration between MUH and the Triskel Arts Centre to mark Positive Ageing Week in Cork:

"Ageing for me is not a condition, but a subject." – A quote from French film director Agnès Varda when describing her creative output in the latter portion of her life, working right up until to her ninetieth birthday and her death the same year. Varda leads the charge in an increasingly productive demographic in the film world: older female filmmakers. This year, for Positive Ageing Week, we wanted to highlight their achievements. Thus, in a joint venture with the Mercy Hospital Geriatric Medicine Department, the Triskel Arts Centre and myself, ran a very special film season at the Triskel Cinema: Reframing Ageing: The Cinema of Older Women, from October 2nd to 4th.

Here we must thank Chris O'Neill, head of cinema programming at Triskel Arts Centre. When I approached him with the idea of a season dedicated to the work of older female directors, he met it with immediate enthusiasm and enterprise. Thanks to his work in sourcing the films, we were able to come up with a fantastic programme. We opened on Monday with the crowd-pleaser Faces Places, from 88-year-old Agnès Varda, a charming documentary where the director travels around the French countryside making murals with a young street artist. Tuesday brought Both Sides of the Blade, from Claire Denis, aged 76, a nerve-wracking account of relationships and infidelity in middle age. Finally, Wednesday closed the season with irreverent, star-studded black comedy The Party from Sally Potter, who was 68 at the time of release.

What strikes about the three works is just how different they are: thematically, aesthetically and tonally. They demonstrate the enormous range and ambition within the pursuits of older women. The films are notably similar, however, in their insights into both society and interpersonal relationships – for better or worse. Perhaps no demographic is better positioned to comment on these matters than a woman who has lived a long life of them.

I hope everybody who turned out to see the films enjoyed their unique perspectives. With over a hundred tickets sold, the programme was an enormous success, and we sincerely thank everyone who was able to make it. Long may we take advantage of these opportunities to celebrate and facilitate creativity in later life!
