

## **Celebrating Excellence**

The Mercy University Hospital Clinical Audit & Quality Improvement Day took place on July 7th. The success of last year's inaugural event has ensured that this Day will now be a staple in the Mercy Calendar.



Clinical Director, Dr. Kieran O'Connor, who oversees the Day, said "We have been humbled and amazed by the number and quality of the submissions. There are 59 accepted projects for the Clinical Audit & Quality Improvement Day. This is a significant increase on the 36 projects from last year. Congratulations and well done to all involved in the projects and in preparing them for the event. The quality of the projects is outstanding overall".

Given the on-going restrictions related to Covid-19 the event was somewhat different to last year. Numbers were monitored in the room and Government Guidelines were strictly adhered to. All the project posters were put on a continuous presentation with recorded audio for each project. These presentations were played in both the Drawing Room and the Ground Floor Parlour throughout the day. Staff were encouraged to come along to view the submissions/ posters throughout the day. The judging panel had a very difficult job but winners were decided upon and the Presentation ceremony was broadcast via Zoom

The overall winner received the **Sr. Laurentia Excellence Award**, which has been named in honour of MUH's former (and last) Matron Sr. Laurentia. ## **Congratulations: Dr. Adrian Brady**

Mercy University Hospital is delighted to acknowledge and congratulate Consultant Radiologist, Dr. Adrian Brady on his election as Vice President of the European Society of Radiology.

Mercy Times took the opportunity to learn about the important work of the European Society of Radiology and Dr. Brady's appointment.

#### **History**

The European Society of Radiology was founded in 2005, by merging the European Congress of Radiology (ECR) and the European Association of Radiology (EAR). The Society has 121,608 members across the globe and has 48 National Member Societies within Europe, 49 Associate Institutional Member Societies outside Europe (on all continents except Antarctica). Together with the headquarters in Vienna, there are also offices in Brussels, Bratislava, Berlin, Bogota with approximately 100 back-office staff supporting the work of the Society.

The European Congress of Radiology (ECR) is held every March in Vienna. This is one of the largest medical conferences in Europe and the second-largest Radiology meeting in the world with over 30,000 participants each year.

Dr. Brady has been Chair of the ESR Quality, Safety & Standards Committee (QSSC) and a member of the Executive Council for the past 3 years. At the end of January 2020, Dr. Brady was elected as the incoming second Vice-President, to take office in March 2020 for 5 years.

This is a 5-year membership of the Board of Directors, progressing through the offices of 2nd. & 1st. Vice-President, President, Chairman of the Board and Past-President. From 2022 to 2023, Dr. Brady will be Society President, President of the Congress in March 2023 and Chairman of the Board from 2023 to 2024.

The appointment of Dr. Brady is of great significance as no Irish Radiologist has served at this level previously. Dr. Gerry Hurley served as EAR President before the merger of EAR and ECR.

The following were some of the highlights for the week:

# Innnovation: Combining Efforts to Achieve Success in the Mercy!

Interprofessional Education (IPE) occurs when two or more professions learn about, from and with each other to improve patient care. Facilitating interprofessional education sessions for students of all disciplines at undergraduate level is now viewed as a possible way to improve collaboration and patient care for future healthcare professionals.

Presently, UCC final year Medical and Pharmacy students already engage very successfully in interprofessional sessions in MUH. In order to further extend interprofessional education opportunities in the hospital an exciting initiative has been introduced between those responsible for the Physiotherapy, Nursing and Medical students on clinical placement.

Over the past 12 months, 93 students from three healthcare disciplines, Physiotherapy, Medicine and Nursing attended educational sessions facilitated by Jennifer Daly (Physiotherapy), Amy Slattery (Nursing), Nora McCarthy and Rosemary Keane (Medicine). The students worked together on relevant case studies and developed a plan of patient care. This not only gave them an opportunity to further improve

knowledge and skills in relation to patient care but also to understand the important role that each healthcare discipline plays in the holistic management of patients.

While currently in its infancy, the initiative, with the support of staff and senior management, has gained momentum. The success of this approach was recently acknowledged nationally at the Irish Network of Healthcare Educators 2020 Conference in Trinity College Dublin where our work was presented by Jennifer Daly, Physiotherapy Practice Tutor. Future plans will involve students meeting patients as part of the interprofessional sessions, with associated research being conducted on this. In this regard we hope to mirror the success of the existing UCC IPE occurring between medical and pharmacy students at the bedside.

# **Introducing: MUH Lead NCHDs**

We are delighted to welcome **Dr. Laura Walsh** and **Dr. Siofra Bennett** to their new roles of Lead NCHD at Mercy University Hospital for 2020/2021.



The role of Lead NCHD is an initiative taken nationally to improve communication with hospital management and the NCHD group. 

# **Speech & Language Therapy Department**

#### Who are we?

Speech and Language Therapy (SLT) is one of the Health and Social Care Professions (HSCP) in the hospital. The SLT department was founded in 2003 and has grown and developed since that time. The team currently comprises five SLTs. We work under the guidelines of the Irish Association of Speech & Language Therapists and the regulatory body, CORU. Our team ethos also reflects the Mercy Values of Compassion, Excellence, Justice, Respect and Team Spirit.

#### **Communication is key!**

As our title suggests a big part of our role in MUH is the assessment and treatment of patients with communication difficulties and speech/language disorders. Some of the patients who need this type of intervention are patients who have had a stroke, head injury or have other neurological conditions. We carry out detailed assessments to diagnose the precise type of communication difficulty the patient is experiencing and provide rehabilitation sessions to help patients reach their potential during the acute stage of recovery. In ICU, we work with patients who have tracheostomy tubes, by introducing equipment such as speaking valves, that allow patients to communicate with staff and loved ones.

#### It went down the wrong way!

A large part of our role in the hospital involves the assessment of patients who have swallowing difficulties. There are many medical conditions that can cause swallowing difficulties, leaving some patients unable to eat and drink safely. Some of these conditions are Parkinson's disease, stroke and chronic obstructive pulmonary disease (COPD). Common complications of swallowing difficulties are

pneumonia and longer hospital stays. The early identification of patients who may have swallowing difficulties is therefore an important aspect of our role.

#### **Working together works**

We work closely with many members of the multidisciplinary team (MDT) including doctors, nurses, other HSCPs, and catering staff, in order to provide patient care and also to drive service quality improvements. One example that reflects this ethos of collaboration is the Mercy Hospital Videofluoroscopy clinic. Videofluoroscopy is a specialised diagnostic procedure, in which swallowing is examined under x-ray by SLTs and Radiologists. Thanks to the time, commitment and expertise of our colleagues in the Radiology department, our patients have easy access to this useful diagnostic procedure. The SLT Department also takes an active role in a number of hospital groups and committees, with a view to improving the quality and safety of services across the hospital. Tara Friel, SLT Manager, is co-chair of the hospital's HSCP group and other team members sit on committees such as the Nutrition and Hydration Care Committee and Medical Records Committee.

#### A referral online saves time

In 2019, the SLT Department moved away from paper-based referrals to an electronic referral system, available to all NCHDs and nurses throughout the hospital. This quality improvement project was carried out with the help and expertise of our ICT Colleagues and many other team members, including NCHDs, our nursing colleagues on the wards, patient flow, ward clerks and the medical records department. E-referrals have enabled our team to respond to referrals quickly and efficiently. In response to the COVID-19 pandemic, the E-referral system has been useful as a means of efficient communication between MDT members, while reducing unnecessary footfall across hospital wards. The initiative was recently recognised in the Clinical Audit & Quality Improvement Day, where it was awarded a prize for 'Improving patient outcomes through effective care'.

He was appointed the first consultant in Emergency Medicine in Cork to Cork University, Mercy University and South Infirmary Victoria University Hospitals in 1993. He was the sole consultant for almost 7 years. Prof Cusack was appointed as Ireland's first (and to date only) academic Professor of Emergency Medicine in 2010 at University College Cork. He served as secretary of the IAEM (Irish Association for Emergency Medicine) for 5 years, on a European Commission DGV committee on Maritime Medical Care, as a consultant representative on the first Executive Board of CUH, and was recently Dean of UCC Medical School. He retired from the HSE and UCC in March 2019.

# Recipe: Butternut Squash & Sage Risotto

#### **INGREDIENTS**

- 1kg butternut squash, peeled and cut into bite-size chunks
- 3 tbsp olive oil
- bunch of sage, leaves picked, half roughly chopped, half left whole
- 1½ vegetable stock
- 50g butter
- 1 onion, finely chopped
- 300g risotto rice (we used arborio)
- 1 small glass white wine
- 50g parmesan or vegetarian alternative, finely grated

#### **METHOD**

#### STEP 1

Heat the oven to 220C/200C fan/gas 7. Toss the squash in 1 tbsp oil together with the chopped sage. Scatter into a shallow roasting tin and roast for 30 mins until brown and soft.

#### STEP 2

While the squash is roasting, prepare the risotto. Bring the stock to the boil and keep on a low simmer. In a separate pan, melt half the butter over a medium heat. Stir in the onions and cook gently for 8-10 mins until soft but not coloured, stirring occasionally. Stir the rice into the onions until completely coated in the butter, then stir continuously until the rice is shiny and the edges of the grain start to look transparent.

#### STEP 3

Pour in the wine and simmer until completely evaporated. Add the stock, a ladleful at a time, and stirring the rice over a low heat for 25-30 mins, until the rice is cooked al dente (with a slightly firm, starchy bite in the middle). The risotto should be creamy and slightly soupy.

#### STEP 4

At the same time, gently fry the whole sage leaves in a little olive oil until crisp, then set aside on kitchen paper. When the squash is cooked, mash half of it to a rough purée and leave half whole. When the risotto is just done, stir through the purée, then add the cheese and remaining butter and leave to rest for a few minutes. Serve the risotto scattered with the whole chunks of squash and the crisp sage leaves.
